### Scott Flack

AIDS lobbyist Scott Evan Flack, 27, died at a hospital in Philadelphia Tuesday from complications associated with AIDS.

Flack, a resident of D.C. since 1985, was born in Northbrook, Illinois, and studied political science at the James Madison College of Michigan State University in East Lansing. After graduating from Michigan in 1982, Flack studied law at Rutgers University Law School in Camden, New Jersey. He graduated from Rutgers in 1985 and moved to D.C.

In D.C., Flack worked as a lobbyist for the lobbying firm of Liz Robbins. While with the Robbins firm, one of his

responsibilities was lobbying on AIDS issues for the city of San Francisco. He also lobbied successfully for federal funding to convert a military facility in the San Francisco area into an AIDS hospital and produced research material for the AIDS Action Council, a national lobbying group in D.C.

Flack is survived by his lover Tony Gover of D.C., and his parents Don and Linda Flack, a sister Debra, a brother Jeffrey, and Jeffrey's lover Robert Dooley. A memorial service will be held in D.C.
